The initially BOR-approved criteria for admission include the GPA of the incoming students, the examination per board program aside from the College Admission Test (CAT), and the face-to-face interview. The takers of the examination are the graduates who were affected by the modular/online teaching modalities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. During this period, it was only the CAT that was used as the criterion to admit students to the university. Moreover, the dominant modality experienced by these graduates is online which may have affected their learning. Also, feedback from students includes poor internet connection, and mental health stresses due to online learning. Several interventions were done by the university such as a catch-up plan, in-house reviews, and provision of load for internet data to better serve our students. However, their learning experiences were claimed to be better during face-to-face classes. The non-met target could be attributed to these interrelated and interconnected factors.
