Pangasinan State University is committed to advancing Sustainable Development Goal 1: No Poverty through impactful community-based initiatives designed to promote sustainable livelihoods and economic resilience. In line with this commitment, PSU has launched a series of targeted activities that empower vulnerable communities by equipping them with skills for sustainable income generation and self-sufficiency.

➤ Empowering Communities: Pangasinan State University Asingan Campus Leads Sustainable Livelihood Program to Combat Poverty in Santiago Island

Pangasinan State University Asingan Campus, under the leadership of Campus Executive Director Dr. Madlyn D. Tingco, conducted a two-day sustainable livelihood extension program on November 23-24, 2023, in Salud, Santiago Island, Bolinao, Pangasinan, aimed at empowering local housewives and contributing to the UN Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 1: No Poverty. The program featured diverse workshops, including "Project MHEAN," "Project BIT," and "101 Ways to Prepare Moringa Dishes," which focused on practical skills such as solar and wind power energy, motorcycle engine maintenance, small arc



welding, Bangus Spanish sardines making, moringa-based recipes, liquid dishwashing soap production, and flower fabric origami.

By equipping participants with these skills, the initiative sought to create sustainable income opportunities and improve economic resilience in the community, aligning with SDG 1's objective to eradicate poverty through skill development and community empowerment. The program received praise from both PSU faculty and the local community for its commitment to uplifting lives and promoting sustainable livelihoods.
